# Big Island Bites BY KAREN PUCCI

KONA PASTA COMPANY. Finally, a decent Italian dining experience on island. This is at the "V" intersection of Walua & Ali'i. Three of us ducked in one evening and were treated to a very nice sampling of different regional Italian cooking. They use table cloths! Well, that is a step up right there. I had a lightly dressed Alfredo pasta with chicken which was done very well. Cooking pasta correctly is an art. Anna had a clam linguine with added shrimp. Nina had the pupu version of steamed clams in wine sauce. We were all very pleased with our meals. There are pasta dishes, lasagne but no raviolis at our visit. Chicken Parmesan, veal scallopini (my next visit), egg plant, oso bucco with pork, salads, del monico steak, soup du jour, pupus including grilled octopus. Desserts include canole, tiramisu, and ice cream yummies. Just an interesting place with some very good food. The menu changes every month so what you see online may not be what you get. Prices start at \$6 and can zoom up to \$75 (for lobster mac n cheese) so not a cheap place. Most of the pasta dishes are between \$20-\$30. None the less, a welcome addition for me. Good, attentive staff. Full bar. Open every day but for dinner only. Parking is limited but parking on the street can be had if the lot is full.

**KONA PASTA COMPANY.** 75-5864 Walua Road Kailua-Kona at the "V" of Walua & Ali'i. Driveway is on Walua. (808) 498-4891. I would recommend reservations if you are going on the weekend. Open every day for dinner only 4p-10p. Inside dining only but tables were decently spaced. Full bar, a/c, all major credit cards. Take the road trip and graze!!!!

**SHAKA TACOZ.** For the last couple of years people have been yammering about this place and how good it is. Well it was never open at a time when we could stop and when we did have the time, it was mobbed with the limited parking. This is the little blue food truck jammed into the corner by the Manago. Then we had an aha moment. We had found them at the Ali'i Marketplace.

Same type of blue food truck. Parking is miles easier. We jumped at the opportunity to sample their fare. What a wonderful and accurate tale had been foretold. Food is outstanding. I had the spicy pork tacos (\$16), the other 3 had the Ono fish tacos (\$17) 3 fried street tacos with cheese fried right into the shells, stuffed with meat, cabbage, sauces. It is not particularly spicy until I put on the Mango Magma hot sauce on it. At first it was just sweet. And then the back of my throat caught fire. Luckily I had tasted it before applying this rocket fuel. A little bit was quite enhancing. But honestly their food is guite swoon worthy without any additives. Fish ono tacos were equally as yummy. I also had the beans and rice as a side. They were mixed together in a small container. Suitable but not notable. "Regular tacos" start \$14 but by the time you add your meat (beef, chicken, pork) and the fried cheese tortilla it is more expensive than their special versions. None the less, just about a perfect experience.

Tacos are their main game. There are burritos and quesadillas worth exploring. A salad is available. Many hot sauces to pep up the meal. We do not yet know what all this would entail but we are bound and determined to find out. Take the drive to either location. Worth every penny.

SHAKA TACOZ. 2 locations-original is just north of the Manago Hotel at 82-6167 Mamalahoa Hwy, Captain Cook. Blue food truck. Parking there is very very limited. Closed on Thurs. The second location is in the Ali'i Gardens open air market. Much easier access. Closed on Mondays as the market is closed that day. Also a blue truck. Both open at 11 AM to at least 8 PM. All credit cards. No alcohol. The absolute bomb of tacos so go check them out.

Ch-ch-changes. Phooey. It appears we are losing our beloved Thai Grindz food truck permanently.

Forgive the lapse in write ups. Life has been hectic, memory extremely fallible and the body...well it's become somewhat unreliable. But, as Yoda would say, "Back I am."

I have a few more tidbits on Dorothy Sayers. She was a poet, essayist, and thought of herself as a Christian Humanist. I believe I mentioned that she was offered a doctorate after years of writing on various ecclesiastical topics as well as translating Dante's Divine Comedy canon, but these scholarly accomplishments in addition to her degrees in classical and modern languages, were not enough to support her family. She turned to a totally different genre to generate an adequate income, mysteries.

She created the Lord Peter Wimsey and became one of the four Queens of Crime. The other three are Agtha Christie (of course), Margery Allingham and Ngio Marsh. They were the Gold Standard of the 1920s and 1930s. However they are as popular now as they were then. (Alingam does not seem to have the same degree of popularity.

Whose Body begins the 12 book series and short stories. We have access to at least two adaptations of the Wimsey series and the one with Ian Carmichael, considered the to be the best Lord Peter, is available on UTUBE. I am hoping that we see another adaptation soon.

Okay, I have to mention Ellery Adams again. In her The Secret, Book and Scone Society. The four main characters with Nora as the leader all have secrets. We means their secrets as the series progresses. Nora, owner of Miracle Books, knows just what books her customers need according to their situations and at the end of the novel she shares those titles.

For example in Ink and Shadows, her fourth in the series, one heading is Powerful Women (Medea, The Dove Keepers, Children of Blood and Bone) another topic is Young Women Struggling to Find Themselves (Jane Eyre, Little Fires Everywhere) and finally Bullying for Kids. You should find them at the end of the novel or take note is titles as you read.

In The Book Retreat series Ellery Adams' protagonist, Jane Steward, supervises the running of Storyton Hall. They hold events for just about anything: writer's workshops, plays etc. The books all have names like: Murder in the Mystery Suite, Murder in the Paperback Parlor...in The Secret Garden. You get the idea. Also -- I got most of my Ellery Adams bookS for \$1.99 or \$2.99.

A quick mention to Carolyn Hart's Death on Demand cosy series. Annie the main character owns and runs a bookstore, Death On Demand and runs a monthly contest for a free book. She displays four or five pictures which depict scenes from a murder mystery. Whoever guesses the correct title first, wins a book.

This might be a cozy series but you will become educated in the mystery genre by book's end. Hart does not supply a list of authors at the end of the book so you the reader will have to write down the authors or titles that pique your interest.

I find that the series reminds me of Nick and Nora from Hammett's The Thin Man. Check it out and enjoy. All books and authors mentioned are excellent beach reading...or read to escape housework...or read to avoid cleaning out the car...or...You get the idea.

I don't know if she does this for every book in the series.

# A Story about St. Judes BY JOE MCDANIEL

Another bit of church history which may not have been passed down to the new generation of workers and could be useful.

When I was building the vicarage, the plans we bought from HPM had a standard 40 gallon hot water tank located in the garage. I noted this was the farthest location from the master bath and kitchen. A location that would waste both water and heat.

In Kona, as I found out building my own home, if you make a minor change on your plans, the back lanai in my case, the plan for the whole house has to go through the permitting process again. When the vicarage was being built that could easily take 6-8 weeks. I opted to build "as is" and planned to do a permitted change after the house was being used.

Therefore, I had two water "stub outs" (Short pipes that can easily be tied into later) placed in the water lines on what I call the back side of the house. I am no longer certain but I believe these are located between the master shower and the kitchen and are within 3' of the edge of the house. If they aren't there they will be on the garage side of the kitchen.

Using these stub outs, I was going to install a Paloma type water heater. Sandy and I used propane for cooking, drying clothes and hot water. When I switched from a 40 gallon hot water tank to a Paloma instant hot water heater, our propane consumption dropped 75%.

If something like this hasn't been done, you might bring it up at the next Bishop's meeting.

Also I left enough money in the building account that a chain linked fence could be built around the back yard. The idea was a visiting priest might have a pet or grandchildren and a fence would be handy.

That was before we were told a visiting priest idea would not work and then Decker showed up. Cynnie, that was 10 years ago and, considering all that has happened, I would be surprised if that money or the building account are still around.

Next time I'll tell you about the privacy shield we have built using roses around our back porch. Agape,

# Are You Ready??

It is my annual Hurricane Season preparedness -- starts June 1. The weather gods are predicting an El Niño summer which may mean a lot of hurricanes swirling out of Mexico.

#### ARE YOU READY TO EVACUATE SHOULD THAT BE NEEDED?

Pack a go bag for each person old enough or healthy enough to carry one. Store them in an easily accessible place. Put some reflective stickers or tape on the bag(s) in case this happens in the pitch black of night. Go bags should include **medications**, **important documents**, **flashlights**, **batteries**, **an emergency radio**, **FIRST AID kit that should include bandages**, **antibacterial creams**, **OTC pain relievers** like aspirin or Tylenol, Aleve type pain relievers. Have a pair of sturdy shoes on or in the bag. If pets are involved, a bag or a few days worth of cans of their food. Don't forget to grab the pet. Keep at least a **half of tank of gas** in your vehicle. It is advisable to store at least 5 gallons of gas in a safe place.

#### **SHELTER IN PLACE**

Plan for at least **TWO WEEKS** of isolation. Remember, we can get completely cut off without any kind of direct hit. A lava flow can block the high way in both directions without touching a home. A good sized earthquake can cut us off by triggering massive landslides. A landed hurricane or tropical storm can also cause road closures and landslides. Flooding can create such havoc as well. We could be days without electricity or phone service.

IF we are stuck, you should have at least:

- 1) a gallon of water per person a day (we had a water issue a while back and that is about what we consumed), food, fuel for the BBQ or grill, matches, hand crank can openers. If you have a generator, make sure have some fuel to run that. Those who have water tanks, keep a clean bucket (with some clean rope) that can be used that to dip into the tank. Add a few drops of chlorine bleach to each bucket of water to avoid cooties.
- 2) **Batteries** to run radios and flashlights, power banks which can keep phones charged if there is still service. Many of the emergency radios have cranks to give it the ability to charge cell phones as well.
- 3) **Emergency radios**-they have come a long way with crank charging ability, built in flashlight, solar charging batteries. Check it every year.
- 4) **Charge up any battery operated tools** drills, clippers, weed whackers; I even have battery powered chain saw. I try to do that every 6 mons or so.
- 5) Finally, **check on your neighbors and friends**. Many struggle here. Be willing-and prepared- to share.

# About Hymn

Walter Chalmers Smith, a prodigy of sorts, who entered university at 13, and went on to become Moderator of the General Assembly for the Free Church of Scotland, the highest position of that organization, was born the son of a cabinet maker in 1824. A prolific writer of both scholarly theological works and poetry, he had intended to enter law, but felt a call to ministry, and pursued and completed a Doctorate of Divinity. Some of his poetry, in the manner of the time for the ordained, was published under pseudonyms. Some of his theological writing was majorly controversial for the Free Church, as it suggested a loosening of the strict rules and a refocus on following Jesus and the practice of mercy.

As a hymn writer, he is remembered primarily for the nearly universally know "Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise". In my not so short list of favorites, it has a prime place in my heart. The hymn manages at once to be both exceptionally reverent and unabashedly joyful, certainly an excellent expression of faith for the season of Pentecost. Though I remember singing it often as a child, it earned a special place in my heart and prayer life during my first year in Wittenberg University Choir. There was a new edition of the Lutheran Hymnal coming out, and the choir was tasked with recording new hymns, new liturgy settings, and new arrangements that appeared in the new hymnal to be used by church musicians as they prepared to use the new book in their congregations. Among the new versions was a new anthem arrangement of "Immortal, Invisible" with a new harmonization with a bit of syncopation enhancing the rhythm. It was the work of a young woman named Barbara Terry, a very recent graduate of Wittenberg, and included guitar and percussion in scoring, something that was a pretty large departure for most Lutherans at the time.

Barbara had been a very beloved member of the Wittenberg Choir, graduating the previous Spring, but very shortly after her graduation had been diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor, and died before the Fall trimester had begun. Her life and her dying, were a witness of faith and joy as she never wavered in her commitment to glorifying God with the gifts she'd been given. Recording her arrangement of Smith's wonderful hymn was an experience of remarkable emotion for all of us in the choir, and for me, an incomparable spiritual experience. As we sang, tears rolling freely down our faces, the final lines, "All praise we would render, Oh, help us to see, 'tis only the splendor of Light hideth Thee!" spoke to me in a way I had never quite heard them in the past. I suddenly understood what Smith meant, and ever since it has fed my soul.

# Anna's Kitchen Corner BY ANNA TOWNER

#### **Easy Peasy Pork and Bean Casserole**

4 - 6 Pork chops (mine had small bones), trim off access fat. Cut in half if extremely large.

In a large bowl mix the following thoroughly.

- 2 1 lb.12oz cans Bush's Best Beans (I like the hickory and molasses combo)
- 2 15.25 oz can corn, well drained
- 1 7oz diced chills (if you drain can, will be milder. I did not drain.)
- 3 small onions, diced

In a large casserole dish make a thin layer of the above mixture. Place pork chops on mixture and cover with remaining mixture.

Cover with foil. Bake at 350 for 90 minutes or more. Time depends on thickness of chops and How many are in the dish.

Be careful when taking out as you will now have more liquid in dish from chops and onions. I spoon some liquid out and put on cat/dog food for a treat.

Serve with rice, pasta, baked potatoes.

# Readings on the Episcopal Church: History, the Ordination of Women, Ethics, and Feminist Ethics BY MOTHER LINDA

#### **CHANGING LIVES, CHANGING CHURCH**

As many women changed their lives, they changed the life and liturgy of the Episcopal Church. Here are references to three women who were essential in shifting liturgy, power and politics.

#### **SONG IN A WEARY THROAT: MEMOIR OF AN AMERICAN PILGRIMAGE**

The Rev. Pauli Murray (1910-1985) was the first African American woman ordained when the Episcopal Church opened ordination to women. Murray was orphaned at the age of four, sent to North Carolina to live with her Aunt Pauline, who referred to Pauli as "my little-boy-girl." Pauli was a Civil Rights activist and Freedom Rider. She was arrested in 1940 and jailed for refusing to leave the "white's only" section of a Virginia bus. Murray was arrested 15 years before Rosa Parks for this act of Civil Disobedience.

Murray went north to study at Hunter College. She identified as having a fluid gender, and today would probably be referred to as a transgender person. Her memoir, Autobiography of a Black Activist, Feminist, Lawyer, Priest and Poet was published posthumously in 1987. Pauli Murray's Feast Day is July 1st. Murray died on her Feast Day in 1985.

#### THE RIGHT REVEREND KATHERINE JEFFORTS SCHORI, PRESIDING BISHOP

Born March 2, 1954, Katharine Jefforts Schori was elected Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church on June 18, 2006. She was the 9th Presiding Bishop and the first woman and Primate to lead a church in the World-Wide Anglican Communion of 38 Provinces. Before ordination, she received a PhD in Oceanography from Oregon State University, where she taught and researched squids and octopuses of the northeastern Pacific. Jefforts Shori is also a pilot.




