# CONFIRMATION

BY CORDELIA BURT, BISHOP'S WARDEN

Confirmation: A rite in which we express faith and commitment to Christ and, by prayer and the laying on of hands by the bishop, receive strength from the Holy Spirit to continue in the life of faith and commitment. Confirmation is prepared for through a period of study in confirmation classes or enquirers' class and involves the reaffirmation of baptismal vows. The acceptance of adult responsibility in the church may be repeated; the service is then called on of Reaffirmation. Adults baptized by a

priest are expected to be confirmed also, but adults baptized by a bishop with the laying on of hands may consider themselves confirmed as well. The service of Reaffirmation is still available, however. When someone confirmed in the Roman Catholic Church or one of the Orthodox churches goes through this service as a way of identifying publicly with the Episcopal Church, the rite is said to be one of reception.


Showers: We started our free hot shower service on Sept. 21, 2013 -5 years 10 months ago. Since then we have hosted 7,267 showers. You can see from the graph of the Monthly Shower Count how we have been growing each year since we opened. In Feb. 2018 we opened a second shower booth which shortened the wait time to get a shower.

When we started this program we had

planned on simply providing the free hot showers to our friends in the community, but on the first day we were open, Elaine Meier had prepared soup for a Habitat Build and Habitat Build had more food than they had people. So Elaine brought it down to St. Jude's for the shower patrons. Soon food became part of our mission.

Over the last several months part of our congregation has been on the mainland and we have had a shortage of volunteers to fill all the necessary jobs. But we have been able to keep things going when members of our shower family volunteer to help.

I remember one Saturday when two of our teenagers, Dejah and Zandar were asked to help set up the shower supplies. They not only helped set up the table and get the supplies ready, they stayed and managed the showers until we closed at 1:00 pm.

## Groovin' with the Grazing Girls

We will not bore you with our trip to Seattle and Vancouver other than to say we ate our way through the Northwest. Again. We did try some new places and hit some food trucks as well. We had our Copper River salmon but not much Chinese. I found a food truck in Vancouver that served "hosin chicken wrap" which was in fact an oversized crepe stuffed with mu shu chicken. Quite delicious but that is about as close as we got. The one thing that stood out was a place called McMenamins. This is a company that goes around and buys up abandoned property, like schools, warehouses, etc. and re-invents them as a commercial enterprises like restaurants, brew pubs, shops and hotels in Washington and Oregon. Many of you from these areas may be well aware of this but it was our first experience with them. We met a friend in one in Bothell, north of Seattle. It was situated on an old closed high school campus. The place was hopping and had all the aforementioned enterprises in this "village." Food was good BTW. I could see great things should they expand into the Rust Belt and take over some of the closed manufacturing plants.

HERBIVORES: This is a very delicious spot to indulge your food fantasies with a lot less guilt. It is a vegan walk-up that can fool most of us with its renditions of Chik'n, pork, cheeses, breads. One of the cool things we like is it offers placards on how to eat a balanced diet as a vegan. We went on the recommendation of our house sitters, Ray and Lodema Hatch. For those who were here, and

have been here when they are on island, their vegan dishes are renowned and a big hit at St. Jude's. They understand good tasting food and this little gem delivers. The menu is surprisingly diverse with things like "pizza", "tacos", "sandwiches", "bagels". The owners strive for local organically grown produce, fruit, veggies, nuts. There were four of us so we have a pretty decent sampling of its dishes. "Mostly raw" walnut tacos (\$9.75) are ground and suitably spiced walnuts. It tasted like taco meat. The taco shell was a lettuce wrap and that was perfectly acceptable. We had the "chik'n alfredo" pizza (\$24.00). No dairy, chik'n was not chicken but some plant based item(s) that sure tasted good. Budda Bowl is yummy as is the "mostly raw" Pad Thai, both priced at \$9.75 each. We have every intention to return to try more pizzas and maybe a sandwich or two. Our bill was about \$77 with tax and tip. The most expensive item was the pizza at \$24.00. Most items start at \$9 and up, so it is a mid priced food joint. Vegans, vegetarians, gluten free folks will be happy with their choices. Us omnivores will like it too. The kitchen is small building in the parking lot in front of TK Noodle. Outdoor seating only but there are umbrellas. All the dishes, cups, plates, utensils, take out boxes are recyclable to boot.



# WHAT'S COOKIN' AT ST. JUDE'S?

#### **Baked Oatmeal**

#### Ingredients

- 3 cups Old Fashioned rolled oats (not instant oatmeal)
- ½ cup Agave syrup (Or 1 cup sugar)
- 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- ¼ cup melted coconut oil
- ½ cup unsweetened applesauce
- 3 small bananas mashed
- 3/4 cup blueberries
- ½ cup chopped walnuts
  - 1 cup coconut for topping

#### **Directions**

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In a large bowl, mix together oats, cinnamon, baking powder, and salt.

  Beat in milk, syrup or sugar, eggs, melted butter, mashed bananas, applesauce and vanilla extract.
- 3. Stir in blueberries and walnuts.
- 4. Spread into a 9x13 inch baking dish or spread into individual baking dishes.
- 5. Sprinkle with coconut.
- 6. Bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes or until coconut is brown and toothpick comes out clean.

Longs Drugs in Pahala is now delivering prescriptions to the Ocean View Community Center (OVCC) on Tuesdays between 8am and Noon.


When patients receive alerts that their prescriptions are ready, they are to call Longs at (808) 928-6252 to request delivery to OVCC. No controlled substances are included in this program.



## **Education for Ministry mentor training**

An Education for Ministry (EfM) Mentor Training took place at the St. Anthony's Retreat Center on O'ahu, May 24-26, 2019. Pam McCoy, a trained Mentor and organizer of the training, has been a strong advocate for EfM, and encourages all persons interested in furthering their call to Christian service, to explore this program and perhaps become a mentor in their church and community. The following is shared by Pam McCoy:

Education for Ministry is a four-year program in religious studies and reflection from the School of Theology at the University of the South. Participants enroll one year at a time, meeting weekly in a small group (no less than 6 people, no more than 12), with a trained mentor. The program has existed since the 1970's and currently has about 6,300 enrolled.

Andrew Han, a first generation Korean American, was the trainer, and three mentors returned with plans to lead groups at their churches: John Condrey plans to start EfM at St. Mark's in Honolulu, and Cynnie Salley and Teri Martindale will be restarting a group at St. Jude's on the Big Island

For the first time, Education for Ministry in Hawaii included native Hawaiians among the trainees. Kahu Ha'aheo Guanson, Kent Ka'ahanui, and Kahu Kaleo Patterson, who are all active in prison ministry, attended the mentor

training to investigate the possibilities of offering EfM to those incarcerated in Halawa Prison on O'ahu. They brought kihei for all to wear at the celebration of the Eucharist, with a coconut to serve as a metaphor for our connection to God (pictured at top).

They also brought each attendee a gift to treasure always, Ka Baibala Hemolele, the Holy Bible in Hawaiian and English, to remember our training together.

They were joined by the Rev. Phil Paradine, a retired Episcopal priest, who has an active ministry in the Hawai'i State Hospital and the Honolulu Federal Detention Center.

All attendees completed training and are certified to lead EfM. It was a joyful and Spirit-filled weekend.

EFM begins at St. Jude's on September 3rd. *Pre-registration is required*.





Mobile Spay and Neuter Wagin': The Hawaiian Humane Society usually has their state-of-the art Mobile Spay & Neuter Clinic at St. Jude's lower parking lot one day each month.

Hawaii Humane Society strives to make spay and neuter accessible and affordable for the Big Island, Hawaii residents. Low-income pet parents and those with limited transportation qualify for their free spay neuter service.

Services they provide are spay or neuter surgery, nail trim for an additional \$5 per animal with spay/neuter surgery, Microchip for an additional \$10 per animal with spay/neuter surgery, Hawaii County dog license, available for \$10 per animal with spay/neuter surgery.

Surgery is done by Appointment Only.

The next scheduled visit to St. Jude's is September 17th. You can make an appointment by going to **HIHS.ORG** on the internet, but the best way is to phone 808-796-0107, which is the direct phone to the Mobile Spay and Neuter Wagin' appointments.

<u>Free Haircuts:</u> On Saturday, July 20<sup>th</sup> Kady and Drew Foster provided haircuts

for our Saturday family. There was a signup-sheet hanging on the church bulletin board. There was room for 12 people to sign up, and while only 10 people signed up, there were several drop-ins; so they provided 15 haircuts.

Tickets available at the door: \$8 per person, \$15 for two, or \$20 for family.


#### Everyday Stewardship: "Time is a Gift"

### Parish Spotlight: Reaching Out at St. Jude's

June 1, 2019, Ocean View, HI

Back at the 2017 Annual Meeting of Convention, St. Jude's Episcopal Church on the Big Island was one of three churches featured in a video that was a part of Bishop Robert Fitzpatrick's Address to the Convention. He highlighted the three churches (St. Elizabeth's, St. Columba's and St. Jude's) as being "at the forefront of the renewal of the Episcopal Church in Hawai'i."

Those bold words captured everyone's attention, especially since two of the three churches featured are located on the Big Island, and were relatively unfamiliar to many in the Diocese.

What was even more fascinating was learning that St. Jude's, which is located in Ocean View on the Southern most tip of the Big Island, for years has had no permanent priest, relying on visiting clergy to lead Sunday services. As a mission church, members handle all aspects of church operations, guided by a Bishop's Committee.

So how does a small church with no resident priest, located in an extremely rural area where many live off the grid, become one of the most vibrant in the Diocese with an astronomical growth rate?

The answer may well be in the Bishop's Address: "Being with those churches, I

can tell you that they are boldly faithful. They not only care for their neighbors, they expect those they serve will become part of their Church 'ohana." He goes on to say, "They share the bold face of Jesus Christ. These are people of God who are not afraid to fail, and who celebrate every little triumph. Bold faith, engaged service, courageous hearts and much food permeate the lives of these congregations."

Although St. Jude's was thrust into the spotlight back in 2017, they are our featured Parish Spotlight today. Not only do they continue to honor their commitment to serve others, but they have expanded upon it, spreading the love of Jesus through every bowl of soup and meal they serve, every shower they offer, and every smile they bring to a young child in their computer lab--- and that generosity of spirit and love has been infectious!

Individuals and several non-profit organizations have come to St. Jude's to partner up with or extend a helping hand to enhance the outreach services they provide. The Big Island Giving Tree, sets up tents during the Saturday shower ministry to distribute clothing, shoes, toiletries, and other items that struggling families may need. Community members who heard about the shower ministry saw an opportunity to serve, and now

show up on shower days to provide free haircuts to patrons. A member of a Catholic Church heard about the computer lab, and wanted to offer her time and talent while addressing a need in the community. She now teaches tech skills to the seniors in St. Jude's computer lab on Mondays. The list goes on.

"Cordelia Burt, is our Bishop's Warden and the Shower Ministry is her baby," says Cindy Cutts, the editor of their engaging Talk Story newsletter. "Every Saturday, Cordelia coordinates the volunteers for making the soup, opening and managing the two showers, Bingo, haircuts, Giving Tree donations, crisis counseling, etc. No story about St. Jude's is complete without mentioning Cordelia, because she is the heart of the church."

Along with their outreach programs, St. Jude's has become a hub of services for the community that includes a food pantry, spay and neuter clinic, a County Senior Nutrition Program, college financial aid sessions and a place where recovery groups meet.

But none of it would be possible without the dedication, commitment, and leadership of every member of the church. When they uncover a need, they find a way to fill it through grants and lots of elbow grease.

Challenges have become opportunities for expanding outreach, as was the case See "More spotlight" continued on page 23

during the Saturday Shower Ministry. Member Cindy Cutts candidly shared how Bingo was recently integrated.

"It started out as a kids craft day to keep the kids occupied while they waited for showers," says Cindy, "They were monsters! But having an organized activity stopped the craziness. When the craft person left, another less-crafty person thought Bingo would serve the same purpose. She didn't expect it to be such a big hit with the adults! Bingo has created a micro-community of friends who cheer each other on and win prizes for one another. Who would have ever thought 'Anything shaking in Ocean View this weekend?' would be quickly answered, 'Bingo at St. Jude's!"

Another popular ministry was developed by Don Hatch, who is also a member of the Bishop's Committee (and plays Santa at the keiki Christmas party). He serves as the administrator and computer engineer for the computer lab that has flourished since its inception a little over a year ago. The lab is the only place in Ka'u to offer free computer services and printing, and recently partnered with Ka'u High School to run an after school program for students. That opened up an opportunity for Jasmine Arguello, one of their members who Don was mentoring, and had been helping to manage the lab. She is now in a paid position to run that after school program, funded by the Department of Education.

As Bishop Fitzpatrick mentioned in his address, "much food permeates the lives of these congregations," and St. Jude's knows how to serve it up! Whether it's a bowl of steaming soup on shower days, distributing canned goods, or flipping pancakes at a church gathering, food has played a huge role in the life of the church. Their newsletter even boasts recipes on their "What's Cookin' at St. Jude's" feature! To help raise funds for their many ministries, they regularly hold spaghetti fundraiser dinners and celebrate seasonal occasions with festive meals like Cinco de Mayo and Oktoberfest. Of course, it goes without saying that they turn out a large feast for their annual Thanksgiving meal that is organized and co-sponsored by Junior Warden, Steve Stigall.


"The thing about St. Jude's outreach is we try to serve what's at the door. And you don't have to be a member to serve. We provide thousands of meals on a meager budget and no one ever goes hungry, the catchment tanks stay full of water - either with rain or purchased delivered water, the lab is always full of users, whenever it's open. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to get involved in service. Some of our most faithful volunteers started out as shower clients." -- Cindy Cutts

But don't be fooled into thinking that all St. Jude's does is outreach. They are a

deeply faithful people with an active women and men's Bible Study, Hannah Makana Ohana Hula, a group that preforms at their worship services (and who also performed at the Annual Meeting of Convention in 2018), and even a Handbell Group! They have been designated "my church" by the community if a funeral, wedding, baptism, etc., is needed. When the church was vandalized, there were as many non-members who turned up with their own equipment to help clean it all up. "The outpouring of love and support was heartwarming," said Cindy.

It is obvious through their pictures, newsletters, and support from the community, that this church is very special and very beloved. They enjoy each other and the people they serve. St. Jude's is a wonderful example of people living into their baptismal covenant by spreading the love of our Lord each and every day in everything they do.


