As I start to pen this, I am hopefully in the last stages of my 2d battle with COVID. From what I am understanding, I am going to be someone who is going to be reinfected continually. Isn't that lovely? There is precedence for this in my life. I have repeatedly contracted the measles in spite of having them and having the vaccination. I just don't make the antibodies for long. If there is an outbreak, I stay in. We take precautions for COVID, get the jabs but for me it will not be enough. The only good news is that my cases have been mild. My big fear isn't for me, it is for anyone else who comes into my orbit whom I may infect.

Only have a short report. We revisited **Tai Shan Farms** way up on Lehua. My awe and admiration for this couple is huge. Kevin and Ester filled a need during the pandemic and now have a fairly loyal following. The restaurant has not expanded-still only a few tables under the lanai roof but the menu certainly has. It should please any eater.

Pupus, full breakfast is only served on Sundays but it is available all day, 4 types of salads which various dressing choices, three course meals with choice of shrimp, fish, beef or pork, vegetarian items, lots of different tacos including one with mac nuts (that is a new one for us), burgers, sandwiches and drinks. No alcohol but you can BYOB.

We went up recently and had the steak and mushroom tacos again (still absolutely yummy \$15 for two) and the fish and chips (\$24). The fish is frozen cod from Alaska but

it was delicious. Ester uses a gluten free batter that was just fine. Crunchy fries.

Anna had the Mary Ann fizzy (\$5) and it was quite good-dragon fruit and lime soda. Our new friend had the dragon fruit lemonade (\$5). Also good. I had plain bottled water (\$5). The food is very good and it is nice change from what is available locally.

Prices start at \$6.50 (at the moment) in the pupu category to \$36 for the surf and turf dinner. They do a robust take-out business from what we saw.

### Girls still say Go Graze!

Tai Shan Farms 92-9095 Lehua Lane-3 miles up from the highway. 808 929 9613. Currently they are open on Sat, Mon, Tues for lunch/dinner 4p-7; Sunday 9a-5p with breakfast option all day plus lunch/dinner. Take-out available.

The other thing is at the Kona Blvd Market where **Thai Grindz** truck parks, there is a coffee bar on the Hilo side of the truck. I think it started out as a nacho bar. But now, look closely. They also serve milk shakes! I wandered over recently when I saw that sign. There was a long list of the shakes they offer. I asked if they could do a regular chocolate one. I was assured they could do that. They were not lying either. I had probably my first milkshake in decades and it was thick, chocolaty and swoon worthy delicious. \$8 for the small and to me, worth every cent.

So if you are **Thai Grindz** fan as we are, you can have a shake with your burger and fries.

## ST. JUDE'S RECIPES

### **Kids Favorite Peanut Butter Cookies**

### Ingredients

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup softened butter
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 ½ cups flour

### **Directions**

Cream sugars, butter and eggs Add peanut butter and mix until thoroughly blended

Sift the baking powder, baking soda, salt and flour together

Gently mix the dry ingredients into the peanut butter mixture until thoroughly blended.



### **Get Ready to Bake**

**Cover** 4 large cookie sheets with parchment paper or Silpat mats.

Roll dough into 1 inch balls and place on cookie sheets with space to expand.

Flatten Cookies - Dip a fork in cold water and stomp each cookie down by making a criss/cross mark with the fork. Make the rolled ball an even disk, not just squashed in the middle.

#### Bake

for 12 minutes or until browned at 375 degrees. Don't over bake! Cover with a tea towel after baking to keep cookies soft. Store air tight.

### Makes about 2 dozen.

If there are boys in the kitchen, you might as well bake a double batch or you will need to bake more

### **Saturday Showers**

Saturday showers are beginning to pick up again as word gets out that we are open and available. We had 32 shower with us on July 22nd. Since we reopened in April we have showered 375 bodies. Along with the hot shower you can get a hot meal while you wait, after you've showered or both before and after. We have served 864 meals on Saturday since reopening in April. We did have someone come by Sunday who is new to the area asking about showers and it made us sad to tell him that he would have to wait until Saturday for his shower. We did however hand him a plate of food to let him know that he was welcome at St. Jude's anytime. It seems we do have a problem with people coming to St. Jude's to fill up their containers with water because they don't like the taste of the well water or because it's a longer walk for them. We checked the large tank that is used for showers and found

it very low so we are having to buy water and we hope it will be delivered for Saturday shower day. Please get the word out that St. Jude's supplies a lot of free things but water is not one of them. The shower you miss because of low water levels could be yours. We want to thank all those who volunteer their time to set the showers passing out towels, soap, shampoo etc. and those who share their talents in the kitchen. More are needed so check and see if you can volunteer one Saturday a month.

#### Haircuts

Drew and Katy are back to have our shower family spiffed up with hair cuts every 8 weeks. They came on 9th of July and will be back on the 3rd of September and they even plan to cut hair on Dec. 24th so your all neat for the holidays. What a great gift this is to our shower family. I think they did 20+ hair cuts and beard trims on the 9th. Welcome back to the family Drew and Katy.

### Seniors

We welcomed the Senior Nutrition Program back into the building on July 8th with a change in the meeting days and times. Since Theresa is only a 20 hour employee and has been given some new duties the


