When Father Doug and Carolyn Coil were serving our parish in September, a number of calamities happened. A towel bar broke, a guest of theirs was injured, Father Doug suffered a severe cut to his hand at the recycling center and one morning McKinney Place woke up to be without water. Fortunately, Father Doug and Carolyn were very good sports about it all, and managed to laugh their way through the comedy of errors and problem solving. It all started with a smoke alarm that would not die.

It began around 3:30 a.m. the first night of the Coil's stay at McKinney Place, when the smoke alarm went off. Carolyn and Doug jumped out of bed to see if the



house was on fire. There was no fire and before too long the alarm shut itself off. Just as the adrenaline receded and they nodded off to sleep, the smoke alarm went off again. Carolyn got up and jiggled the battery inside it, silencing the alarm and went back to bed.

REMEMBERING THE QUEEN

On Saturday November 11th in remembrance of Queen Lili'uokalani's death 100 years ago, churches across the islands were requested to ring their bells 100 times at 8:30 am, the time of the Queen's death.

After blowing the conch shell in 4 directions, Buddy Sherfield rang the bell at St. Judes 100 times. The sound of the bell was haunting and emotional and gave me and others present chicken skin.

The beloved Queen Lili'uokalani inherited the throne upon her brother, King David Kalakaua's death in1891. She ruled the Kingdom of Hawaii until the overthrow in 1898.

Imprisoned in Iolani Palace, the Queen fought to restore her Kingdom but surrendered the Kingdom to avoid blood shed.

The Queen was a gifted musician and composed over 150 songs and chants. We sing "The Queen's Prayer" at our Sunday Mass, which was composewhile she was imprisoned in the palace. Also her song "Aloha Oe" is her most fa-

mous song and has become a cultural symbol of Hawaii. It is often sung at the end of gatherings and celebrations.


Queen Lili'okalanai Trust was established December 2nd,1909 for the care and education of the orphaned and destitute children of Hawaii. It remains today, supporting the children of Hawaii in various ways.

After the overthrow, the Queen withdrew from public life until her death from a stroke on November 11, 1917 at the age 79.

Queen Lili'uokalani, known for her Christian values is interred in the Royal Mausoleum at Mauna Ala on Oahu.


Ka'u Food Pantry News

Ka'u Food Pantry, Inc., next distribution is Tuesday, December 26 at St. Jude's Episcopal Church on Paradise Circle-Mauka, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. We ask all of our participants to respect the grounds where this will be held. Volunteers are always needed and welcomed, beginning at 8:30 a.m. on that Tuesday.

We are expanding our services to include [based on availability] free clothing provided by a non-profit, Big Island Giving Tree, pet food provided by the Hawai'i Humane Society. These items are donated to the Food Pantry, free of charge. We are holding a monthly fund raising event at the Ocean View Swap Meet featuring clothing and baked goods available on 2nd Saturday of most months.

The Ka'u Food Pantry, Inc., is staffed entirely by volunteers and is a non-profit agency whose mission is to feed the hungry of Ocean View.

We are currently feeding up to 120 families. Our program is designed to provide 1-3 days' worth of nutritious food to help people who run short of money, benefits and/or food by the month's end. As a non- profit, the Pantry is able to purchase food from the

Hawaii Food Basket at 18¢ per pound. One dollar can buy a half of a case of food to help your community.


Christmas Cookie Bake Off St. Jude's Kitchen Tuesday, December 5th 3pm - 6pm

Many St. Jude's family know that I was elected to the Diocesan Council at Convention this year, but some may not be familiar with the Council and its role and function.

The closest analogy is that the Diocesan Council is the Board of Directors of the Diocese. Budgeting, contracting, spending, and property matters are all within the responsibilities of the Council. There is a parallel body, The Standing Committee, whose re-

sponsibility is primarily spiritual matters. Both groups are elected bodies that include clergy and lay elected from the major islands, as well as "at large" members for both groups. Standardly, we are elected to three year terms and may serve a maximum of two terms in the same role.

The Bishop serves as the President of Diocesan Council. The Convention looks to nominate potential members with previous experience in finance, real estate, budgeting and contracting in their professional experience or as members of board or governance in nonprofit organizations. People who encouraged my nomination felt that my experience in health care administration, and on the boards of nonprofits might be a good fit.

Though I was elected as the Big Island Lay Representative, just as any Director on any board, I have the responsibility to fairly consider the overall best interest of the organization. I will seek to be an effective conduit of Diocesan Council information to the congregations of the Big Island as I strive to assist all of the members of the Council in managing the business of the Diocese.

Please add the Diocesan Council, and me, to your prayers as I begin this new adventure.



December 3, 2017, marks the beginning of Advent, and The Episcopal Church is making available a newly developed Advent resource to help Episcopalians everywhere to take up Jesus' ministry of reconciliation and healing.

Every congregation will soon receive in the mail *Preparing to Become the Beloved Community*, a multi-fold poster and resource pack with prayer, reflections and activities for each week of Advent. The resources can also be downloaded **HERE**.

Preparing builds on the Becoming Beloved Community vision document and resources, which Presiding Bishop Michael Curry and President of the House of Deputies the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings and their supporting officers introduced earlier this year. The document lays out the Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation and justice.

"During Advent, Christians focus on how much we need Jesus to bear light, healing and hope in a broken world," noted the Rev. Canon Stephanie Spellers, the Presiding Bishop's Canon for Evangelism, Reconciliation and Creation Care. "This is a mysterious, vulnerable time. We're opening to Christ. We're opening to different neighbors and strangers who are Christ among us. We hope these resources meet the real hunger among Episcopalians to live like Jesus Movement people."



Pauline's Sweet Potato Soufflé



You will find variations of this recipe served for Thanksgiving and Christmas throughout the South. This particular recipe came from Deloris Loeb's friend Pauline. Deloris is Beverly (Loeb) Nelson and Bob Loeb's mother. Some recipes call for walnuts instead of pecans, but most southerners believe that makes it a Yankee recipe. Since moving to Hawaii Beverly has made it using Macadamia nuts and she also made it using Kabachi squash instead of sweet potatoes.

Serves: Six Ingredients

LULEU.				
Soufflé	1	40 oz can	drained	Sweet Potatoes
	1	cup		Sugar
	2	100	beaten	Eggs
	1/2	stick	melted	Butter
	1	tsp		Vanilla
topping	1	cup	dark	Brown Sugar
	1/2	cup		flour
	1/3	tsp		Baking Powder
	1/2	stick	melted	butter
	1	cup	crushed	Pecans

Drain the sweet potatoes and mash them with a fork, then add all of the soufflé ingredients and mix using a hand mixer. Put it into a 2 quart oiled casserole dish.

Mix the topping until it is crumbly, and then sprinkle it over the top of the soufflé mixture.

Bake at 350° F for 40-50 minutes.

<u>Variation:</u> I like to keep a few of the pecans whole and I place them on top of the topping. It doesn't change the taste, but I think it looks better.





AMA & Healthy Eating

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

What Does the AMA Say About Eating Healthier?

I think we all have heard of the American Medical Association. It is an association of 200,000 physician members. Here is what Wikipedia says about the AMA: "The American Medical Association (AMA), founded in 1847 and incorporated in 1897, is the largest association of physicians—both MDs and DOs—and medical students in the United States."

The AMA's stated mission is "to promote the art and science of medicine and the betterment of public health." The Association also publishes the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), which has the largest circulation of any weekly medical journal in the world.

At its annual meeting June 14, 2017, the AMA issued a policy statement that called for the reduction of sugar-sweetened beverages and processed meats, and an increase in the availability of healthful, plant-based foods in hospitals.

Under the resolution, physicians and hospital staff are encouraged not only to counsel their patients about the health consequences of a poor diet but also to lead by example by offering healthier foods at the hospital.

Specifically, the resolution states that the "American Medical Association hereby call on U.S. hospitals to improve the health of patients, staff, and visitors by (1) providing a variety of healthful food, in-



cluding plant-based meals and meals that are low in fat, sodium, and added sugars, (2) eliminating processed meats from menus, and (3) providing and promoting healthful beverages."

Removing sugary drinks from vending machines and replacing them with water, unflavored milk, and unsweetened teas and coffees may be the easiest place to start making hospital food choices healthier, according to the AMA.

"Excessive sugar consumption has been linked to some of the nation's most debilitating diseases, and limiting the consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages will go a long way toward helping people prevent the onset of these diseases, improve health outcomes and rein in health costs associated with chronic diseases," Dr. William E.

Kobler, an AMA board member who was part of the policy decision, said in a statement from the organization.

American Medical Association also calls for Healthier Foods in SNAP Program. SNAP stands for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly known as Food Stamps.

The resolution, which was co-introduced by the Medical Society of the District of Columbia and the American College of Cardiology, "requests that the federal government (1) support Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) initiatives to incentivize healthful foods and disincentive or eliminate unhealthful foods and (2) harmonize SNAP food offerings with those of Special Program is Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)."

Also, the American College of Cardiology (ACC) recently released new recommendations that urge hospitals to improve patient menus by adding healthy plant-based options and removing processed meats, which are linked to 60,000 cardiovascular deaths a year.

The ACC's "Heart-Healthy Food Recommendations for Hospitals" say that "at least one plant-based main dish" should be offered and promoted at every meal. The recommendations also say that processed meats—bacon, sausage, ham, hot dogs, and deli meats—should not be offered.

The ACC recommendations also call for plant-based main dishes and a variety of vegetables and fruits to be served in all cafeterias and on-site restaurants.

So, maybe there is something to this Whole Food Plant Based way of eating. Has your doctor suggested that you reduce the amount of sugary drinks you drink?

Has your doctor suggested that you stop eating processed meats?

If not, you might want to ask them why not but, be prepared, they might not like you asking the question.
