The Giving Tree was in St. Jude's lower parking lot on Saturday, Dec. 21st, and their next visit to St. Jude's is planned for Saturday, Jan 18th, 2020.

Each month they seem to get bigger and better organized.

In addition to clothing, laundry soaps, food items, and fresh fruit, they had vitamins.

Their plan is to be at St. Jude's each month on the third Saturday of the month.

St. Jude's hosts Free Hot Showers, Free Hot Meal, and Community Computer Lab. When we started our Free Hot Shower and Free Hot Lunch community support programs in Sept. 2013, we had no idea that it would grow into what we have now.

As we were getting ready to publish the newsletter, I noticed Phyl Laymon, Rev. Mary Janda, and Deborah (Kepi) Davis working in the kitchen and had to snap a picture. When we first started the Saturday Soup Kitchen one pot of soup was enough, but now it takes 3-5 pots of soup. Phyl started extending her soup by serving it over noodles. Today she served three large pots of soup and several bags of noodles. She brings the noodles uncooked and cooks them as she serves soup. Today I noticed several people asking for a lot of noodles with a little soup over it.

We have been running short of volunteers lately, but as we get into winter, we are getting some of our cold country folks coming back to Hawaii for the warm weather. A plus for our shortage of volunteers is that some of our Saturday family have started signing up to work as volunteers.

As we neared the end of 2019, I updated the weekly shower count, and learned that we have **hosted 7,872 showers** to our Ocean View community since we have been open. For the last two years, 2018 and 2019, we have averaged hosting 30 showers each week.

Keiki's (Children's) Christmas Party:

For the last couple years St. Jude's has been setting up four tents in our lower parking. The first tent gave out tickets, the second was "Santa's Reading Room" where they received books as a gift, the third was "North Pole" where they visited Santa and receive a Christmas Stocking and gifts, the third tent was "Mrs. Clauses' Kitchen" where they get a drink and cookies.

This usually took place at the same time the community Keiki's Christmas Party was going on across the street in the park. We didn't compete with each other, we/they told the youngsters what was going on across the street.

This year we joined the community Christmas Party and will only use two tents. We will have "Santa's Reading Room" where we give out books, and "North Pole" where we give Christmas Stockings and other gifts.

Since they already have a Santa, our Santa retired this year.

Our Next Fund Raiser is a Spaghetti Dinner which is usually hosted in January. The date hasn't been set, because the Bishop's Committee decided to wait until the new board members have been elected to set the schedule of events for 2020.




This is an exciting time for St. Jude's. Questions, answers, more questions, conversations, explorations, all leading us to "Living as Spiritually Mature Christians."




Ka'u Food Pantry Distribution January 28th

WHAT'S COOKIN' AT ST. JUDE'S?

For I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink. I was a stranger, and you invited me into your home. Matthew 25:35

Homemade Toffee

Old fashioned toffee with chocolate and chopped mac nuts

Ingredients

2 cups butter

2 cups white sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

1 cup chopped macadamia nuts (optional but recommended, toast mac nuts before adding to toffee)

Directions

Prep the pan –

- 1. Cover a large baking sheet with aluminum foil or parchment paper. Then sprinkle some of the nuts on the baking sheet before pouring on the toffee.
- 2. In a medium to large heavy bottomed saucepan, combine the butter, sugar and salt over low heat until butter is melted, whisking constantly. Bring to a steady (not rolling) boil over medium to medium-high heat, and cook, whisking constantly, until the mixture has reached 285 to 300 degrees F.
- 3. Remove toffee from heat and stir in vanilla. Pour mixture onto the prepared baking sheet.
- 4. Sprinkle the chocolate chips over the top, and let chocolate soften for a few minutes. Spread the chocolate into a thin even layer. Sprinkle with chopped macadamia nuts.
- 5. Refrigerate until set. Break into pieces, and store in an airtight container.


