

The friend who accompanied me was familiar with hand chimes and bell choirs, and Ginger was so enthusiastic, how could I decline?

Christmas Crèche

The life-size Nativity scene that graced the church yard this Christmas was made by Ginger Stewart's late husband Bill. Here is the story of the St. Jude's crèche.

In 1991, in the churchyard of a small village just south of the Oregon-California border, was an almost life size crèche that caught the eyes of Bill and Ginger Harris, as they attended the friendly congregational church over the holiday season.

Bill was so fascinated with the life sized crèche, that he took pictures of it, and thought not much more about it until almost a year later and they were looking at all the pictures they'd taken over the 6 months of being in northern California. Before Ginger knew it, Bill had created a large scale drawing on huge graph paper from the snapshots. Bill began to construct a replica for their church yard.

The crèche first appeared behind the pulpit, complete with a spotlight in the manger shining up from where baby Jesus' face lay. The light enhanced a stained glass window and lit up the ceiling. Another year, the crèche graced the yard in front of the church.

After a few years, it seemed good to mount it on the lanai at Ginger and Bill's, complete with lights so that it could be seen from the road, as passersby would slow down to enjoy it.

After Bill died, the crèche remained stored under Ginger's house, until some years later, when St. Jude was "home" for Ginger, and she mentioned it at a Bishop's Committee meeting. Ginger offered to display the crèche at St. Jude's. Definitely the worse for wear, and clearly weathered, the figures certainly deserved refurbishing, but served the pleasure of folks at St. Jude for two seasons. This year, Elaine and Cindy felt moved to repaint them. The crèche was set up in the church yard, to the delight of parishioners and the many community members that visited the church throughout the season.

St. Jude's is proud to display the life-size crèche, and honors the memory of the man who made it.

rang true.



programs, the facilities are made available to help people or organizations in the Ocean View area. As a regular in the church yard, tending to the landscape or prepping for an event, I've seen how St. Jude's outreach ministries affect the community.


Free Wi-Fi: St, Jude's provides Free WiFi access for the community. This service is available in the church yard 24x7. There are also electrical plugs where they can charge the batteries in their phones and computers. Last year a family moved to Ocean View to build their retirement home and they used the service to keep in touch with their friends and children. They told us their children called St. Jude, *"The Patron Saint of WiFi"*.

Free Hot Shower: Last year St. Jude's got one of their long term visions operational. They built a hot shower and opened it to our friends in the community every Saturday. The first day the showers were open, one of our congregation said she had food left from another community program and wanted to share it with the people taking the showers. The next week someone else had some food and by the third week it became part of our Saturday event. The St. Jude's congregation provides a free hot meal to our friends that drop by for a hot shower and anyone else that is hungry.

The second week the showers were open, my wife Beverly and I were working the shower when a woman came out of the shower crying. We were worried that the water was too hot and might have burned her. She said she was ok, but this was the first time she had warm water running over her head in over six months – it was just so wonderful.

The next week we had two young ladies (11 and 12 years old) run up and say, "Mr. Don, we were told we have to pay for the towels, how much are they?" I told them, "We have free towels, soap, shampoo, and hair conditioner." Over the next couple weeks I went through all of the body soaps, shampoo and hair conditioner with the 12 year old. She picked out all of the ones with sweet fruity smells, and she kept a stash of her favorites in the church office.

St. Jude's is a place many of us go each Sunday for Eucharist services followed by an Aloha Social hour. But to the Ocean View community it is much much more.


Why do we have Seattle Seahawks updates at St. Jude's?
