Lent Study:


Last year we started a new tradition at St. Jude's when many members of the congregation gave up a couple hours each Tuesday to study and better understand the Episcopal Church.

For that study we used "Those Episkopols" written by The Reverend Doctor Dennis Maynard as a guide for the study.

This year Cynnie Salley and Terri Martindale lead the study using another of his books titled "Forgive & Get Your Life Back" as our study guide.

In this book, Dr. Maynard points out that if you fail to forgive someone who has hurt you and hold a grudge, it keeps the wound open and you are like a prisoner frozen in your own pain. Each time you open or think about your grudge you will feel the pain again.

Dr. Maynard helps us understand that forgiveness is a process, and identifies and describes each of the steps in the forgiveness process in this book. He illustrates this book with stories and humor, and as he described examples of how it works, I couldn't help but see people from my past and how they couldn't forgive and move on and how they kept their wounds open for more pain. He used the parable of the Prodigal Son in several of his examples, which gave me a more in depth insight into the story.

Groovin' with the Grazing Girls

'Ohelo Café This little spot is tucked away in the Volcano Village, not in the park. We have been many times over the past couple of years and have enjoyed the food. When Pele blew her top though, the business got hit hard. We were not sure it would survive the sudden and unexpected drop in tourism. They had to cut out lunch service completely at one point.

Happily though, on a recent visit, lunch service had been restored. The menu was not as robust as before but it was quite serviceable. It is still printed up anew everyday with some regular fare and some surprises. Their signature wood fired pizzas are still on the menu. We had a party of four so there was room to sample the fares. We ordered their pupu of the day, roasted cauliflower with a bechamel sauce. Quite delicious we thought.

I had their ribs. The portion was a bit on the skimpy side but the ribs are fall off the bone tender with a zesty BBQ sauce I found appealing. The burger eaters were happy with their fare and the catch of the day sandwich suited the diner fine. The problem was they had run out of fries. The server thought they were still skittish on ordering "too much" as this had been happening somewhat regularly. I had a heads up and was able to substitute rice but one of our party did not get the same notice. She got roasted Brussel sprouts which were quite tasty. The chef also sent out a small plate of sautéed veggies on the house, and they comp'ed the meal that was shorted without notice. That is a proper and acceptable practice.

We did not sample the pizza this time out but it has been quite good in the past. Bottom line: *Girls say Go Graze*. Hopefully the shortages issues will be resolved soon. Support our local businesses.

Magic's Beach Grill- This place finally opened in the spot formerly occupied by Jameson's By the Sea, then Anthony's By the Sea (for those of you who care or remember) on the makai side of Ali'i Drive at White Sands. It took some time to get things rolling. The owner put a food truck in the parking lot for a while to tease folks on what was to come. And what has come is wonderful. The old establishment has been gutted, brightened and made into a fun, lively spot now. It is very noisy inside and they are working on that. This is mid to ouch! priced restaurant but well worth the stop.

One of the things that made this a frequent stop for us is location, location, location. This property has limited outside seating right on the water on a seawall as well as inside seating. Magic's has expanded the availability of the outside seating by putting in a large indoor/outdoor full bar. The staff is young, enthusiastic but respectful. For now, we will not make a recommendation as it is still too new and has some obvious kitchen consistency problems. Once we give them more time to settle down, we will return and give you a full blown report. We expect it to become another fave. None the less, do not be afraid to give it a try. We think you'll have a good experience.

Anthony Bourdain is known for both his food travel shows No Reservations/Parts Unknown, and his cookbooks. They both are riveting, entertaining and educational. While the title, Medium Raw: A Bloody Valentine to the World of Food and the People Who Cook, might be enough to send you running off in the opposite direction, don't.

Bourdain describes the cooks, their kitchens and often in not so flattering words. Whether they are Top Chef winners and/or foodie icons such as David Chand who I don't know, or Alice Waters who made "slow food" and "farm to table" terms that became part of a culinary movement/fashion. Of course, at my age I find the first one silly since that is what I grew up with and still cook that way.

Kitchen Confidential: Adventures in the Culinary Underbelly (he does like lurid, evocative titles, doesn't he?) "Reveals twenty-five years of sex, drugs, bad behavior and haute cuisine." I literally couldn't say it any better. I have only read the first 25 pages and they made me even more appreciative of all the hard work, pressures and successes/failures that chefs have throughout their respective careers. And apparently successes do not necessarily remove or even lighten the daily pressures. And both of his books make me very glad I did not go into a life of professional cooking.

I felt I should include these in the autobiographical category as they present huge slices of his life.

Julia Child's My Life in France, written with Alex Prud'homme, literally sounds just like her!! It has also made me realize how excited and involved with life and food she actually was. She used a lot of exclamation points. She had been meaning to write this particular book for ages, perhaps decades, but it was not til her 80's that she was ready to tackle describing her early years in Paris, relying on the letters she and her husband both wrote and received.

Additionally, this book is the basis for the very popular movie, Julie and Julia with Meryl Streep and Amy Adams. Both very enjoyable.

Dearie: The Remarkable Life of Julia Child is an absolute delight. Whoever would have thought that an upper middle class woman who barely knew how to boil water would have become a world renowned chef and TV personality. She was married to a mid level diplomat and when they went to Norway, the embassy hosted a welcome party. I was just as appalled as Julia at the pupus, spray can cheese on a cracker, and not even a Ritz cracker at that!

Bob Spitz does a wonderful job of showing us the woman who couldn't speak French but was determined to learn both the language and the food. Her attitude toward life, food and cooking is an absolutely joyous one. On her TV show she dropped a chicken on the floor, she had no apologies or excuses to offer. She simply went on with the show. (Do remember, food was prepared ahead of time for various viewings of the cooking process.) However this particular episode made me a believer of the 5 second rule.

Love, Betty: A Mother/Daughter Journey is both biographical and autobiographical. The main focus is Betty DeGeners' journey to accepting Ellen and her homosexuality. The book reveals the difficulty Betty had in overcoming the conservative, Republican culture in which she had been raised. Mother and daughter both had to be patient and understanding. Both knew that this could make their relationship stronger or create discord and unhappiness that might permanent. Both wanted the best for each other.

Not only did love and acceptance win out, Betty joined PFLAG, Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays and is an advocate of fairness and justice for all.

Oriental Cabbage Salad

Serves: Six				
Ingredients				
Salad	1	head	shredded	Cabbage
	1/4	cup	toasted	Pine Nuts
	1-2	cups	shredded	Carrots
	1/4	cup	chopped	Cilantro
	2	packages		Top Ramen Noodles (dry, uncooked, crumbled - do not use seasoning packages)
	1/4	cup		Green Onions or Sweet Onions
Dressing	4	Tbsp.		Splenda Sweetener or Sugar
	1	tsp.		Black Pepper
	1/2	tsp.		Salt
	1/4	cup		Salad Oil
	2	tsp.		Sesame Oil
	1/4	cup		Rice Vinegar
	1	tsp.	powdered	Oriental Mustard
	1/2	tsp.	558	Cayenne Pepper

You can make the dressing and refrigerate until needed.

Put the Cabbage, Cilantro, Top Ramen Noodles, and Onions in a large bowl. Brown the Pine Nuts and add to the salad.

Just before serving - pour dressing over the top, mix or toss thoroughly, and serve.



<u>Variations:</u> You can use other nuts or none at all. Add strips of grilled chicken to make a complete one-dish meal.



Seder Dinner (Passover Feast): The Seder Dinner is a Jewish ritual performed by multiple generations of a family, involving a retelling of the story of the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt.

Seder customs include telling the story, discussing the story, drinking four cups of wine, eating motza (unleavened flatbread), and eating several symbolic foods placed on the Passover Seder Plate.

It was first started as a way to educate the Jewish children about the hardships faced by the Jewish people as they were exiting Egypt to gain their freedom. The story is told by the father with help from the mother and other family members. This year Fr. P. Douglas Coil and Carolyn Coil were the father and mother for this event.

After the story was told we enjoyed a meal of pascal lamb, mashed potatoes, and green beans, topped with gravy. After the meal was over we, sang several songs. Then the program ended with the traditional washing of each other's feet.

Stations of the Cross was observed on Good Friday. This is an emotional dramatic reading, devoted to the Passion of Christ, recalling a series of events at the end of Jesus' life from his condemnation to his burial.



Easter Sunday: This Easter Sunday was especially beautiful with all of the flowers decorating the church. We had a wonderful service and lots of our friends that we see twice a year, on Easter and Christmas Eve, were there.

After the service we had we had a fabulous Aloha Brunch which was mostly breakfast casseroles and fruit salad. We had 61 people attending Easter Sunday Service and around 10-15 more joined us for our Aloha brunch.

On a sad note, it was the last Sunday for Fr. Douglas & Carolyn Coil to be with us, even though they will be back with us later this year.

Giving Tree: The day before Easter Sunday "Giving Tree" set up tents and tables in our lower parking lot and gave out lots of clothing and various other items like toothbrushes and razors. This time they had a lot of new clothing to give away as well as some used. They also had some shoes and coats.

Many of the people visiting them came on up to the church to have a bowl of soup and some took showers. There were a lot of people around church that I had never seen before.

The Giving Tree's next visit is scheduled for Saturday. May 18th. Come on by to see what they have and while you are there, come on up to the church building and share a bowl of soup. You can also have a free Hot Shower.

Operational Support Duties: Around four years ago we started an effort to identify all of the jobs/duties needed to keep St. Jude's operating efficiently. The last thing we did was to identify who was in charge/responsible for each job and who their backups were.

This month Cordelia pointed out that several of the key players responsible for some of the jobs have moved away from Ocean View and other people have taken over their jobs. So, I resurrected the document, removed the names of people who have moved away, and updated what I could.

Next the Bishops Committee will review and update where they can and then it will be posted for the congregation to review and sign up for various duties.

One of the new duties identified is that someone (probably me) has to update the document each year after we elect new members to the Bishops Committee.

Free Haircuts: On Saturday, March 16th Kady and Drew Foster provided haircuts for 14 of our Saturday family. They will be back again on Saturday, May 18th. This time we are a little better organized with a sign-up sheet for 12 haircuts. The last time I checked, there was still space for two more to sign up.

This service integrates with our Free Hot Shower and soup kitchen program. First the recipients will finish their shower, and then come for their haircut.

<u>Protea Plants:</u> Last month I mentioned that a couple of the protea plants in our church yard have started to bloom. This month there are 8 -10 plants in bloom and some of them already have 5-6 blossoms. This sure adds a lot of color to our church yard.


The Board of the Ka'u Food Pantry is changing. Dave Breskin will no longer be President and has left the Board. At this writing, a new President has not been installed. Allan Humble, who also runs the Ka'u Chamber of Commerce, is the VP. He can be reached at 253-486-3917 for emergency food. I will continue to be peripherally involved.

The Ka'u Food Pantry, Inc., is staffed entirely by volunteers and is a non profit agency whose mission is to feed the hungry of Ocean View. We are currently feeding up to 120 families. Our program is designed to provide 1-3 days worth of nutritious food to help people who run short of money, benefits and/or food by the month's end. As a non profit, the Pantry is able to purchase food from the Hawaii Food Basket at 18¢ per pound. One dollar can buy a half of a case of food to help your community.

Donations of non perishable food items and funding are welcomed. You may donate funds via St. Jude's-just write Food Pantry in the memo area of your check. Checks maybe written directly to the Food Pantry as well. Make the checks payable to the Ka'u Food Pantry, Inc., P.O. Box 6184, Ocean View, HI 96737. Ladies Bible Study will be held Thursday morning at 10 AM. All ladies are invited to lunch in the Fellowship Hall after the B. S. is done.


The pastor would appreciate it if the ladies of the Congregation would lend him their electric girdles for the pancake breakfast next Sunday.




Geologist Dr. Richard "Rick" Hazlett, a world-renowned volcanologist, was summoned by the USGS's Hawaii Volcano Observatory to help monitor and interpret the eruption. From his front-row seat, Dr. Hazlett was able to photograph and observe events, all the while learning as much as he could as quickly as possible.

On the first anniversary of the eruption, Ocean View residents will soon have the opportunity to share his vantage point.

Dr. Hazlett will also answer questions from the audience.

Dr. Hazlett is the co-author of the very popular "Roadside Geology of Hawai'i" and the definitive text book on volcanoes, entitled "Volcanoes: Global Perspectives".
