Joan usually has one of the students setting at the front table with her and they learn to call out the numbers. Now that Bingo has become so popular, there are lots of prizes for the winner. The prizes are spread out on the head table.

Last month one of the bingo winners came to the head table to choose their prize, and the prize he chose was Joan's personal water bottle. Undaunted, Joan gave it to him.



Computer Lab: Our Computer Lab first opened on April 14th so it has been open for 28 weeks, and it is an enormous success.

We have been averaging 12-13 people in our Saturday open lab time. Since we only have six computers this means people are sharing the same computers. Our busiest day was when 19 people used the lab.

The lab has been open for over 110 hours and with an average of 12 users each Saturday that comes to around 1,350 hours of computer access for our community.

Last Saturday (October 13th) we had a new student so I explained how to sign in, ex-

plained about the rules and I gave him a set of earbuds. He sat down at one of the computers, plugged his earbuds in, and then looked at me and said "I don't know how to make it work". Daden was sitting next to him and he told me that he would help. Daden asked the new boy what he wanted to do, then showed him what to do and after a little while, the young man was doing ok on his own, Daden went back to his computer, but watched the new boy to make sure he didn't need any more help.

Daden is one of the regulars in our lab and is always willing to help the new users, he often helps set up at the start of the lab and put the computers away at the end. He is also very good at letting the new users know about the lab rules and often tells them about no liquid or food around the computers before I do.

Today (October 20th) a lady walked up to Jasmine as we were taking down the computer lab and ask her if she worked in the computer lab, and Jasmine said, "Yes." She confessed that she didn't know much about computers and wanted to learn. She asked Jasmine if she could come to the Computer Lab and learn how to use the computers. Jasmine told her, "Yes, I can help you learn how to use the computers". This was one of the goals for our lab in the very beginning – to help people learn new technology. Paulette Zupancic has been helping the Senior Nutrition Program seniors learn to use software, social media and manage their cell phones as an extension of our computer lab.

Mobile Spay and Neuter Clinic: The Hawaiian Humane Society had their mobile unit working in our lower parking lot on Monday, October 8th. They were open from 7:30 am until 4:00 pm.

Future Dates in Ocean View are (1) Monday, November 5th, and (2) Monday, December 3rd.

Hawaii Humane Society strives to make spay and neuter accessible and affordable for the Big Island, Hawaii residents. Low-income

We thought it a good idea to reiterate some of our fave cheap eats places. Many of us will be having family and friends descend upon us and it would be nice to know there are places you can go without sacrificing the monthly budget. Some of them have not yet been officially reviewed but we have sampled and approved. Unless otherwise noted, they accept credit cards, but always check ahead. Things can change.

First off, BIG ISLAND GRILL [Kona on Kuikini]. Good food, a/c, reasonable prices. Daily set specials. Portions are huge.

PINE TREE CAFÉ off of 11 on the way to the airport. Very inexpensive, served on disposable plates, good food and now that there is a traffic light, easy to access and to get out. Great for a quick bite before the flight or on your way home.

KAMANA KITCHEN INDIAN FOOD at the wharf shops in Kona. Good food, not muddy tasting, spicing can be absent or melt your tongue, up to you.

JUNJIRI- Excellent Thai food, not open on weekends. Cheap and fresh. Underneath Choice Mart in the middle.

Right down the street is the MANAGO HOTEL. Good food for a lot less than most places charge. Meal hours are limited so check ahead.

ISLAND ONO LOA.-Absolute must visit for burger lovers in the back alley on Ali'i Drive.

ROB'S BAKERY by Patz Pies, Keala-kekua. Inexpensive, fresh food, emphasizing breakfast goodies and "grab n goes".

THAI GRINDZ FOOD TRUCK- Currently parked on the high graded lot the corner of Kona Blvd and Highway 11 here in OV. Colorful food truck Friday-Sundays 11:00a until sundown. Items under \$10, great food and a hoot to visit. They usually have Jackson chameleons by the order window.

TITA'S TACOS at Hana Hou in Na'alehu. Inexpensive tacos and they taste terrific. CASH ONLY. 11:00a to 6:30p [M-F] and 11:00a-3p [Sat/Sun]

COSTCO. Hey where else can we get a hot dog and a soda for \$1.50? They have expanded to chicken bakes, pizza by the slice or whole, Caesar salads, mocha drinks, hot turkey bakes, BBQ brisket and other things.

EL MAGUEY-Cali/Mexican style (Kona). Good food. At the 4 way stop at Kuikini and Kaiwi.

ONE ALOHA one of the best shave ice stores we have found. In Kona on the Kuikini Highway now across the street (mauka side) from Big Island Grill at the Hanama light. They serve straight up ice cream too. [Note: BIG ISLAND SHAVE ICE has moved out of the now defunct Blue Dragon parking lot; don't know where it went].

9/15/18

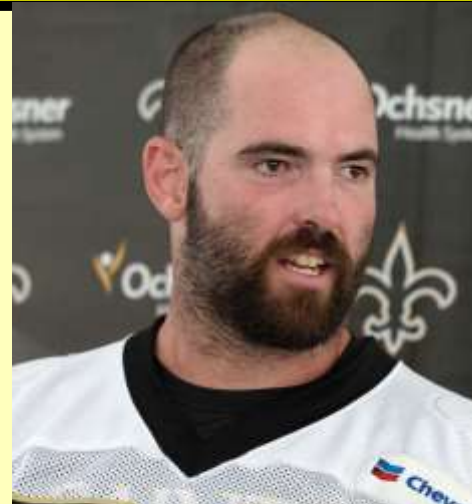

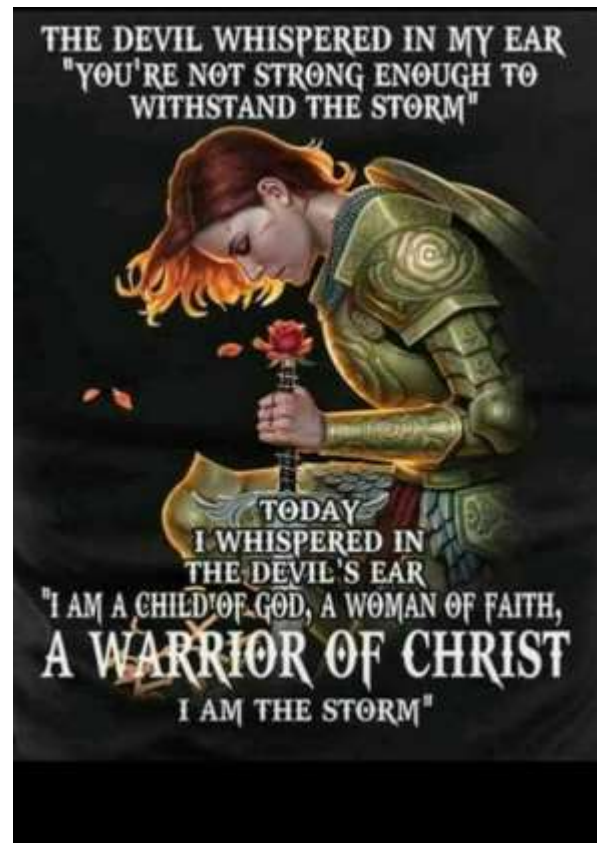

I DON'T KNOW WHAT TO SAY

The nature of my work as a flight, emergency, hospice and ICU nurse, and then as a poison information specialist resulted in a nearly daily, and, sometimes, multiple times daily, need to be of comfort to people who were experiencing fear, anxiety, anger, grief and loss. Often I found myself feeling the need to say something of comfort, but also feeling unsure what I could offer that would actually help. Over the years I came to understand that in most of these situations, what I managed not to say was much more important than what I said.

An adage I learned from one of my most beloved mentors is, “No one cares how much you know, until they know how much you care.” Truth is, most of us have significant discomfort when we experience and anxiety say things like, “I know how you feel....”, “When this happened to me, I....”, or, “I knew someone who had exactly the same thing, and...”. This can lead us to say things like, “I know how you feel....”, “When this happened to me, I....”, or, “I knew someone who had exactly the same thing, and...”. When we move in these directions, it is usually our own anxiety or feelings of inadequacy we are addressing, and not the needs of the person we are trying to comfort.

Over the years I came to understand that in most of these situations, what I managed not to say was much more important than what I said.

I had a wonderful lesson in sharing actual comfort from an amazing human being when my partner died of cancer after several months of terrible pain and suffering. The lesson came from an elderly church friend who had been widowed twice and had cared for two adult children who died. “This is your journey,” she said, “I can’t tell you how to make it, and neither can the folk who are likely to tell you what they did or what they think you should do. I don’t know what you’re going through, and neither does anyone else. Do what you feel is best. I’ll pray for you, and with you, if you like. If there is something I can do to help, I will certainly try.”

For me, there was tremendous comfort in her recognition that my situation was unique simply because it was mine and happening to me. It gave me a new perspective on trying to help others in difficult times, and helped me understand that often the most comfort I could offer was, “I am sorry this is happening. I’m praying for you. Please let me know if there is anything I can do.”

Rain, Rain go Away Come Again Another Day

We've had a very different rainy season this year. The last couple months has been similar to the rainfall in Bangkok Thailand. Dry and warm in the morning and then in the afternoon clouds would form and it starts to rain. I've visited Bangkok several times and around 1:00 pm we would start looking for a restaurant or bar to go into until the rain stopped.

Recently many of our afternoon rains have been like that. A storm didn't blow in, the clouds formed over us and it started raining.

Yesterday it was nice and sunny, then around 2:00 pm it started raining and in 2 hours it rained 2.5 inches. This month we have had 11.25 inches which is the wettest month since we moved to Ocean View.

So far this year we have had 34.25 inches of rain, with over two months remaining in the year. This year there were three months with no measurable rain and six months with 1.5 and 11.25 inches of rain.



On October 19th, two inches of rain fell in an hour and flooding occurred in Ocean View.

So far this year we have averaged 3.4 inches per month.

I moved here in late 2011 and started measuring the rainfall in my yard in 2012. Across those seven years we averaged 18 inches of rain which is 1.5 inches of rain per month.

In 2014 had 34.5 inches of rain. That year every month had rain and eleven of those months had between 1.25 and 8.5 inches of rain. June 2014 was the only month with less than an inch of rain.

ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

We celebrated the life of St Francis in October, with the Blessing of Animals by Rev. Mary at St Jude's. Growing up, St. Francis was one of my favorite saints. He was born in 1181 in Assisi, Italy. After a decadent youth of pleasure and sin he longed for something more meaningful.

I loved the story of St. Francis, giving up a life of wealth and privilege to retreat to a simple life in the Italian country side; a life of solitude, service and prayer. Besides his love for his fellowman, St. Francis called all creatures his brothers and sisters which earned him the title Patron Saint of Animals. Some people accused him of madness and others called him holy.

St. Francis founded the religious Order of the Franciscan in 1209 AD. Members take vows of poverty and chastity and service.

An interesting story is found in early church history. In 1219 St. Francis went to Egypt in an attempt to convert the Sultan and to put an end to the Crusades. Another story tells of St.

Francis' love and faith that created such religious ecstasy he bore the Stigmata, the wounds of Christ's passion.

St. Francis died in October of 1226 at the age of 44. His message of love and service inspire many today. He was canonized a saint, two years after his death in 1228.

The prayer of St Francis is favored by many and truly reflects the lifestyle he lived:

*Lord,
make me an instrument
of your peace;
where there is hatred,
let me sow love;
where there is injury, pardon;
where there is doubt, faith;

WHAT'S COOKIN' AT ST. JUDE'S?

Thanksgiving Green Bean Bacon Casserole

Ingredients

- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon white sugar
- 1/4 cup onion, diced

- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup crumbled bacon
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
- 3 cans green beans, (French sliced) drained
- 1/2 cup crushed Ritz crackers
- 1 tablespoon melted butter



Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees
2. Fry or Oven roast the bacon to crisp and brown. Crumble and set aside.
3. Melt 3 tablespoons butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth, and cook for about a minute. Stir in the salt, sugar, onion, and sour cream. Add green beans, and crumbled bacon, then stir to coat.
4. Pour mixture to a 2 1/2 to 3 quart casserole dish. Spread shredded cheese over the top. In a small bowl, toss together cracker crumbs and 1 tablespoon melted butter, and sprinkle over the cheese.

Bake for 30 minutes or until the top is golden and cheese is bubbly.

This recipe is also delicious without the bacon.

Remembering Queen Lili'uokalani

There will be special Evensong on Sunday, November 11th (5:30 PM) at the Cathedral of St. Andrew, Honolulu, to commemorate the 101st anniversary of the death of Queen Lili'uokalani. In keeping with historic Church practice, this commemoration is observed on November 11th as the date of the Queen's death, and, therefore, when she entered into the greater glory of God and the communion of saints.

The Episcopal Church's liturgical calendar now authorizes this observance for local use on this day. As a Diocese, we have resolved to encourage Queen Lili'uokalani's inclusion in the general liturgical calendar for the entire Church. An important part of that movement will be need to be that we encourage commemorations throughout the Diocese. The Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music was directed to present "the 80th General Convention [in 2021] with a clear and unambiguous plan for a singular calendar of 'Lesser Feasts and Fasts.'" Local commemorations are strongly encouraged and

the Queen is accounted as such. We must encourage commemorations throughout the Diocese providing liturgical resources (I will look to the Native Hawaiian Ministry Committee to take up this work for the good of the whole Diocese). We then need to share it nationally and internationally (encouraging a cultus of particular popular devotion in remembrance of the Queen). We also need to build an argument about why the Queen should more than a "local" commemoration and is a witness to the whole Church. We can then return in 2021 to press for her inclusion in the liturgical calendar (or maybe in 2024).



What can you do? If you are on Oahu, you can attend and encourage attendance at the Cathedral's Evensong (Sunday, November 11th, at 5:30 PM). That morning in your local worship, remember the Queen in the Prayers of the People. You might you include the following collect:

Traditional language:

Almighty God, we praise thee for the life and witness of Queen Lili'uokalani, who in the midst of great adversity remained steadfast in her commitment to peace, forgiveness and service to thee. Accept, we pray, our gratitude for a faithful example in her perseverance, her gift of song, and her love for her people. All this we ask in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

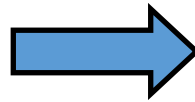
Contemporary language:

Almighty God, we praise you for the life and witness of Queen Lili'uokalani, who in times of great adversity remained steadfast in her commitment to peace, forgiveness and service to you. Accept, we pray, our gratitude for a faithful example in her perseverance, her gift of song, and her love for her people. All this we ask in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A schedule to read through the Gospel over the course of those 158 days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays, as well as Thanksgiving and Christmas) may be found on the diocesan website [HERE](#).

I particularly call us to a method of Bible reflection called *Lectio Divina* ("divine reading"). Though a very old prayer practice, I have been using *Praying Scripture for a Change: An Introduction to Lectio Divina* by Tim Gray (Ascension Press, 2009) as a guide (page numbers noted below are from this book). I do need to note that Gray is a conservative Roman Catholic and some of his insights may not be helpful in our context. The method suggested, however, can be valuable.

Though other translations of the Holy Scripture can certainly be used for this prayer, I encourage you to consider the Common English Bible (CEB) translation (<http://www.commonenglishbible.com>). In the [Scripture schedule](#), there is link each day to the lesson of the day at the CEB in the Bible Gateway Online Bible (<https://www.biblegateway.com>).

The Five Steps of Lectio Divina

1) This is the first step, called '*Lectio*' ("reading"). For this first step, read the passage as if you've never read/heard the story before. You might even consider reading the passage out loud. Carefully and slowly read through each sentence and try to notice different words or phrases as they jump out to you. As Gray suggests, "As you begin *lectio*, then take a moment to ask God to help you switch off the cell phone in your soul" (page 44).

2) The second step called '*Meditatio*' ("meditation"). Read the scripture passage again, and take a few minutes to sit and be in that moment. Imagine you're in the story. Who are you in the story? What are your senses? What does it look like? Can you hear anything? How are the

people in the scene feeling? How do you feel when people speak or act? Pray through what you experience and let God speak to you. It's a lot more about listening than about talking, and about seeing what God wants to show you. What is it like to experience Jesus' presence, words, or actions? How do you react? What goes on in your heart? What prayer is on your heart? As Gray reminds us, "In contrast to meditation techniques aimed at emptying the mind, Christian meditation makes full use of the intellect in an effort to understand God's Word and to hear God's voice" (page 62).

For those who would like an aid with the readings and *Meditatio*, I suggest a two-volume commentary/reflection from Anglican Bishop N.T. Wright: *Matthew for Everyone: Part 1, Chapters 1-15* (Westminster/John Knox Press, 2004) and *Matthew for Everyone: Part 2, Chapters 16-28* (Westminster/John Knox Press, 2004). These books include the full text of the readings from Matthew's Gospel with the Bishop's comments on each passage.

3) The third step is '*Oratio*' ("prayer"). Read through the scripture again, slowly lingering on each verse. Now, offer to God the prayer of your heart. It's time to pray it, to turn it towards God and respond. The emotions and thoughts that have come out of meditation move us into authentic prayer - conversation with God. Your prayer doesn't have to look any particular way. Share with God whatever is on your heart. If you're struggling to pray, tell God and ask for help. "The key is to remain in relationship with God as you mull connections and implications your meditation on Scripture has for your life and for the lives around you" (page 79).

4) Read the passage again and then it's time for '*Contemplatio*' ("contemplation"). This is a heavy word that really just means to sit and reflect. Take a few minutes to sit quietly with God. What was shown to you? What did you say to God? Be calm and listen. Something you might like to do is journal or make a note in the margin of your Bible so that your

thoughts/feelings don't get lost once you're back out in daily life.

5) Gray adds a fifth step to the traditional *Lectio Divina*: 'Operatio' ("work" or "action"). Here you can consider how our time with the Scripture will impact our practice as a follower of Jesus Christ. Is there something from the day's Scripture reading and time of prayer that leads you to a particular action or behavior (or change in behavior) that can be engaged today? This, too, is something you might like to record in a journal or the margin of your Bible.

I suggest concluding with two prayers from the Book of Common Prayer:

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

O God, by your grace you have called us in the Diocese of Hawai'i to a goodly fellowship of faith. Bless and renew us, your people. Grant that your Word may be truly preached and truly heard, your Sacraments faithfully administered and faithfully received. By your Spirit, fashion our lives according to the example of your Son, and grant that we may show the power of your love to all among whom we live; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

At that point, we decided not to go to the store...lifted her out of the car seat and found the inserts into the buckle...she was sitting on them, and we all went inside and played some more, until afternoon nap time. Max came home while she was sleeping, so off we went to the condo. Leah is coming home this evening and Ellie will be so happy to see her! We were honored that these 80 yr. olds were trusted to babysit. I now know that as long as I can outrun them...we're copacetic. Enough for today...

9/18, 19, 20/18

It's been a lazy week and it has been sooo hot and muggy! Being outside is miserable! We stuck around the condo with forays out and about to run errands. The highlight of the week was going to Emeril's for dinner with Leah and Max. Ray and I walked down there and back...a bit less than 1/2 mile each way! Dinner was good...It was "date" night for them....no kids!

9/21/18

Off to Atlanta today. We decided to do it in two days going and one returning on Monday. We stayed just outside of Montgomery at Wind Creek Casino and Hotel. Not a good choice. Casinos have that liquor/stale cigarette smoke odor that permeates everything. We walked all around the Casino looking for table games: blackjack, roulette...maybe craps...But only slot machines to be

found. As I believe that the slots eat up your money faster than any other betting game...we had dinner and went to our room. The rooms were very comfortable...In fact the bed was the most comfy I've been in since leaving home! End of week 4...

WEEK 5

9/22/18

We slept in this morning...then got organized and checked out heading for Atlanta. We needed gas for the car and food for us. We found a gas station and a Waffle House so everything got filled up! It was a about a 2 1/2 hour drive, mostly through forest and fields; cotton and hay. Found our way into the city and to our hotel. We are staying at the Omni which is fairly near the new Atlanta stadium. It is huge and strange. It's part of the very big CNN complex which incorporates the basketball arena with the football stadium across the street. As we were there early and Max had left passes for us which enable us to see him after the game, we went to try to pick them up at will call. These big stadiums are so difficult to get around and find your way to anyplace other than your seat...and even that is hard at times. This stadium is about a year old and is state of the art and actually quite nice architecturally. It is right downtown in the CNN complex. It has a retractable roof which is amazing and an art form in and of itself, both from inside and outside. But, regardless of the building, it has state of the art people working there.

9/25/18

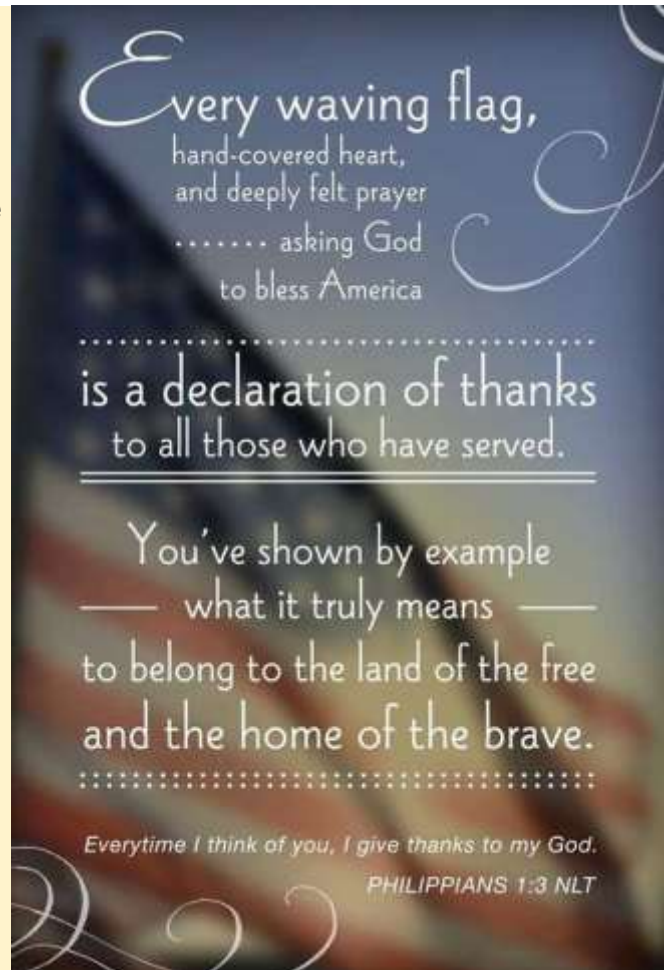

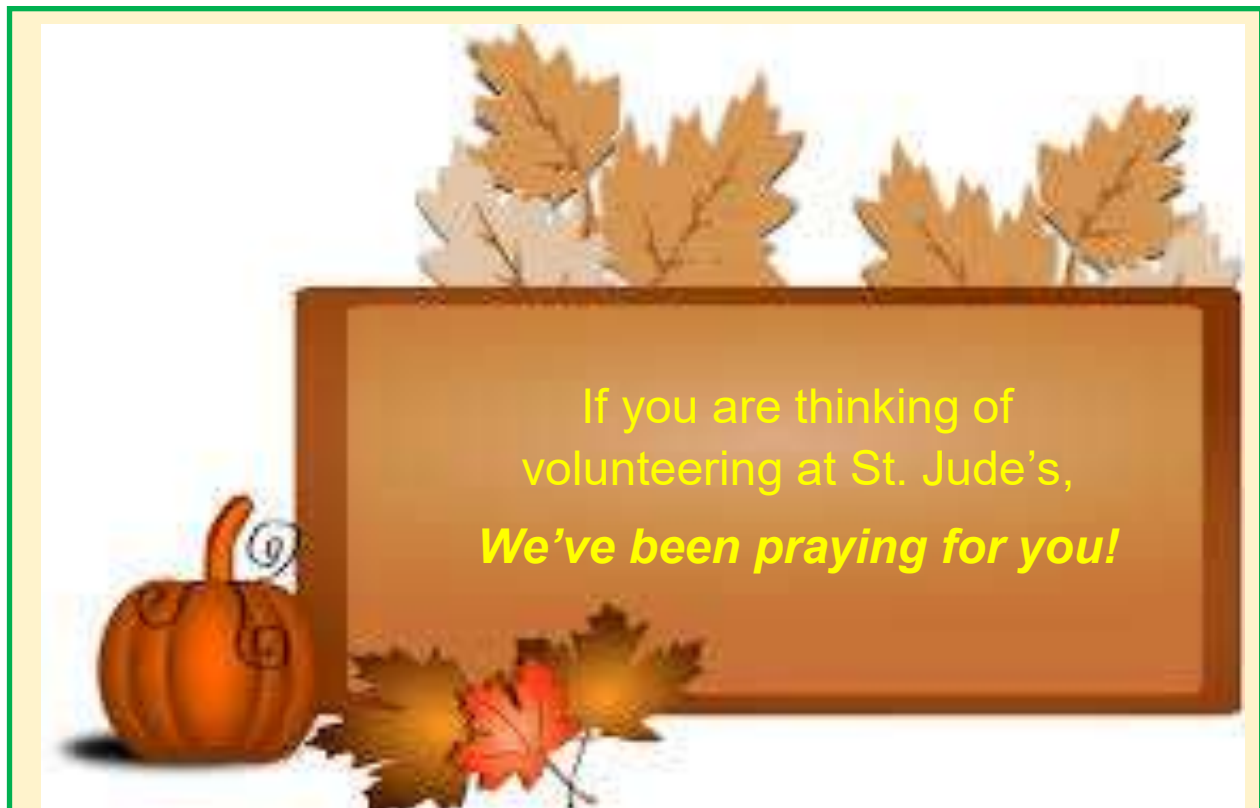

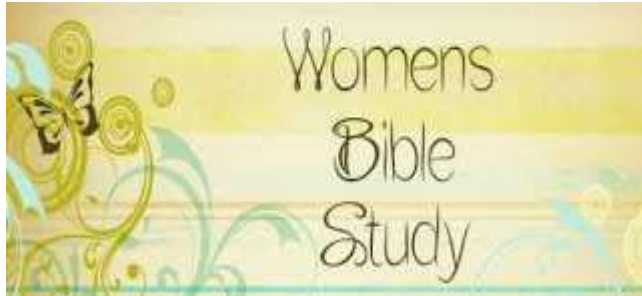
