BOOK REVIEW

Last month I wrote about Capon's THE SUPPER OF THE LAMB and admitted that I had read very little of it. So, I returned to it this past week and loved chapter, The Burnt Offering. As an Episcopal priest Capon knows the title will be associated with "burnt offerings" which is mentioned in Leviticus. Then the priests would burn offerings twice a day on the altar to show their devotion and steadfastness. Then the meat was mostly eaten for communion.

Individuals could also do this, and although possibly shared, would not serve the same weight as the priests' communion, it would still be a significant religious ritual. It could also be an outward sign of piousness easily observed by others. Call me cynical. However Capon isn't referring to these kinds of offerings specifically.

The author is referring to the cooking we do in our own kitchens. On page 31 he talks about browning the stew meat and how long it takes to do it right. When the meat is cooked, remove it, add more olive oil then your onions and garlic. The appropriate wine so you can loosen the front. The female leads have a book on the pot's bottom. Return meat raise heat for a brief time. Then plate See "Book" continued on page 19 your masterpiece and serve.

Favorite line in chapter 3? "...the next time you go to check out of the supermarket...circle round the dairy case again, swap your margarine for a pound of butter and walk up to the checker with your head held high, like the last of the big spenders." Page 42

Notes from Father Angus

I was warmly welcomed at the air- what our ministry is like in Lonport by your great Bishop's Warden, Cordelia and Richard. As we approached Ocean view, I noticed the board by the road advertising St Jude's, saying -' the small church with the big heart'. Although, as I write this, I am only a week into my stay, I can see that St Jude's really does have a big heart - sharing God's love through service, hospitality, commitment and laughter. It's a joy and privilege to serve St Jude's for September

There is much here that is similar to the shape of ministry back in North Lambeth, London.

Like you we warmly welcome all into Church and try to be a Christ centered one that is outward looking.

Being part of the Anglican/ Episcopal family our worship is very similar and I'm reminded of Romans 12:5 '....so we, who are many, are one body in Christ and individually are members one of another... ' We are family, despite the physical distance, the pond, between us!

I thought it might be of some interest if I shared a little of don:-

North Lambeth parish has 35,000 people within its boundaries, but is geographically only a mile and a half in width and length. As a local Church we are there to serve everyone and like you, have a big heart.

I have included here a few photos showing something about our ministry:- You can see the team doing a first aid course! there is also one of our annual Easter egg collection for those in our children's hospital in the parish, a church group going away for a day trip (some of our congregation can not get away for a break so we try to take them to the seaside,) one collecting boxes of goods to support the Ukraine appeal, our Chapel wall covered with paintings from our children responding to the theme 'what makes you happy," our two church Wardens, (our version of Cordelia and Richard) a prayer board and Easter cross outside the Rectory me collecting steel pans for worship, me trying out two of our homemade boards, that Suzette my wife made,

that we use at our church fete and finally one of my wife, Suzette and children Clemmie and Rufus

We have a team of lay and ordained ministers to help- from a lay Chaplain to our school who is also our children's minister to a priest whose role is to look at how we can creatively best care for God's creation and set up a new Eco church.

Our congregation is very diverse in culture and socio/economic background- the church is one of the few places in the area where everyone can meet and form new relationships- it's the glue that keeps the body together.

Worship ranges from a service of quiet contemplation to welcoming our new steel pans into our Sunday Eucharist once a quarter. We are blessed in having a large and vibrant Sunday school.

Our outreach mission ranges from offering employment units to the marginalized to our annual parish fete, in Lambeth Palace gardens, which is within the parish, welcoming over 2,000 people.

One of the pressures of ministry



that we face is that the local population is quite transitory and people move in and out of the area and thus church and so we have to work, as well as we can, to maintain numbers. The congregation of 2001, when I arrived as Team Rector, has changed several times with only a few staying all the way through up to present day.

In all that we do, just like you, we try to serve God as best we can living out the truth that- 'there is neither Jew not Greek, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female for you are all one in Christ

If you are ever over visiting London you will get a big Aloha from us



CHURCH LINGO

Many people have asked over this last month "what is the Archbishop? I go once again to my trusty Dictionary for Episcopalians.

Archbishop: Title given in the Church of England and some other branches of the Anglican communion to bishops who have responsibilities beyond the limits of their dioceses. There are two archbishops in England, the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Archbishop of York, each of whom is responsible for a province containing many dioceses. In addition, the Archbishop of Canterbury is historically regarded as the leader of the entire Church of England and the Anglican communion. In the Episcopal Church, we do not have archbishops and have chosen to call our chief bishop the Presiding Bishop, who, unlike an archbishop, ceases to be a diocesan bishop when elected as Presiding Bishop. The Presiding Bishop's responsibilities are primarily administrative rather than sacramental, although the Presiding Bishop is intended by the Prayer Book to be chief consecrator at the Ordination of bishops.

Archdeacon: Title given to a priest on the administrative staff of a bishop who has primary responsibility for communications with other clergy and who may also have responsibilities for work with small churches, stewardship, and Christian education. An archdeacon's title is The Venerable, and he or she is entitled to wear a purple cassock.

Anglican Communion: Worldwide assembly of churches which, in communion with the Church of England, recognize the leadership of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Each member church sends representatives every ten years to the Lambeth Conference to discuss matters of mutual concern. Includes some 64 million members among the Church of England; the Church of Ireland; the Episcopal Church in Scotland; the Church in Wales; our Episcopal Church; the Anglican Church of Canada; the Church of England in Australia; the Episcopal Church of Brazil: the Church in the Province of Burma: the Church of Burundi. Rwanda, and Zaire: the Church of the Province of Central Africa: the See "Words" continued on page




